# Even the lake needs a holiday.

Beginning in early November, SCE&G will lower Lake Murray to enhance the water quality. The lake will be gradually lowered until it reaches 350 feet in early December, where it will remain until early January. Afterwards, it will be allowed to refill. SCE&G is coordinating this effort with the South Carolina Department of Natural Resources.

Drought conditions in recent years have prevented SCE&G from conducting a scheduled draw-down since 2006. Periodic draw-downs every three-to-four years help to control aquatic weeds and allow rainfall to naturally scour shallow coves of unwanted sediments, all of which enhance long-term water quality and aquatic life in the lake.

An added benefit of the draw-down is that lake residents and businesses will have a window of time to make dock repairs and shoreline improvements. For questions or permit requirements, please call SCE&G Lake Management at 803-217-9221.

## **What does Lake Murray really mean to you and your family?**

Is it simply a beautiful lake for power boating, sailing, rafting/skiing, fishing, canoeing and pontoon riding and parties .... **and** for your electricity reserve through SCE&G? **YES to all ---** but there are many more benefits provided by Lake Murray ... more economic and personal benefits for all citizens!

## **What benefits do citizens receive from Lake Murray?**

Lake Murray is the “Jewel of the Midlands” and a “Jewel for South Carolina.” The word Jewel implies value; jewels attract capital. Just as citizens receive economic benefits, directly or indirectly, when any major industry enters with capital investment and remains in SC, those same citizens benefit (from enhanced capital investment) when Lake Murray brings revenue/capital into the state from across the Southeast. Tourism, regional and national events, homes and economic development related to Lake Murray bring hundreds of millions in capital to the area, and that capital flows into the state coffers and into various communities across SC. When properly used, value compounds more value.

While pooled in the Midlands, “the Jewel” brings over 600,000 outside tourists a year, provides many forms of recreation, and is a direct revenue source for businesses such as restaurants, marinas, boat dealers, state parks, guides, real estate sales, rentals, city events, boating and fishing tournaments, etc. Studies indicate that Lake Murray contributes about \$64 million annually to the SC economy, with possibly an additional \$40+ million from major fishing, sailing, boating, and other events.

Built as a major resource for metro/community electricity, Lake Murray has served the community well. Once she provides electricity, recreation and the capital she has attracted, she then provides her clean water to many communities and cities in her areas of influence. Lake waters flow eventually into the Atlantic Ocean by confluences with the Broad, Congaree, Wateree and Santee Rivers. # LMA Richland County Meeting September 17, 2013

LMA presented a host of distinguished guests and speakers at the meeting, including SC House of Representative Nathan Ballentine; Dr. James Couch, Director of the Center of Advanced Technical Studies; Jim Landreth, SCE&G Vice President for Fossil and Hydro; Lt. Ken Simmons, SCDNR; Lt. Mark McColman, Richland County Sheriff's Department Marine Patrol; and Lt. Garry Rozier, Lexington County Sheriff's Department Marine Patrol.

Dr. Couch welcomed the membership to the new facilities of Center of Advanced Technical Studies for School District 5 of Lexington and Richland Counties located in Chapin.

John Altenberg, Sea Tow-Lake Murray owner, presented the association with a check for \$925.00, representing an ongoing fund raising program for LMA. The funds help the non-profit association in its quest to preserve, protect and enhance Lake Murray through conservation, science, education and good governance.

Lt. Simmons gave a presentation of SCDNR job responsibilities, resources and statistics for Lake Murray. McColman, Rozier and Simmons talked about the marine patrol units and law enforcement on Lake Murray. They brought with them a helicopter, unit, a mobile command post and marine patrol vessels used in response and rescues. Attending as an LMA member, Sheriff Leon Lott, RCSD, spoke of the value and importance of LMA membership.

Rep. Nathan Ballentine addressed the membership with offers to help Lake Murray residents and the Association in lake issues. SCE&G Jim Landreth spoke about the lake licensing progress and announced a water level drawn down taking place this winter.





# Government & Legislative Affairs

The Lake Murray Association public meetings in September and October addressed lake issues, at the Richland County meeting on September 17th by Representative Nathan Ballentine of House District 71, and by Senator Ronnie Cromer of District 18 at the Newberry County meeting on October 15th.

Senator Cromer spoke about the Inter-Basin Transfer Act of 2011, which provides public input for the transfer of river basin waters from one place to another. Senator Cromer briefed everyone on a grant of \$1.5 million shared by South Carolina's Department of Health & Environmental Control (DHEC) and Department of Natural Resources (DNR) for an assessment of South Carolina's waters, rivers, lakes and aquifers. He cautioned that "Water will be a major issue in the future. In the existing permit process there are 190 permits in SC to draw water. We now have a cooperative working relationship with other states."

Another topic of keen interest related to complaints about noise and high speed power boats on the lake. There are no specific boating speed limit laws; however, a boating operator may be cited for "failure to regulate speed that may cause danger, injury, damage, or unnecessary inconvenience" according to DNR's Handbook of South Carolina Boating Laws and Responsibilities. Operators may also be charged with negligent operation. Senator Cromer, a long-time supporter of good governance for the lake, suggested that lake residents and users contact his office for information and assistance concerning legislation and other lake issues.

A big thank you to both Rep. Ballentine and Sen. Cromer for their time and participation in our meetings. Both of them are strong supporters of our efforts and stand ready to assist with our concerns.

## Environmental Committee News

### LAKE MURRAY ASSOCIATION MONITORING OF PERIODOTIC LAKE LEVEL DRAW-DOWNS

Before the introduction of sterile grass carp into Lake Murray to control the noxious weed hydrilla, there was much discussion about the benefits of lake draw-downs to control this weed. Though there is some level of disagreement as to the effectiveness, it is recognized that the root structures were subjected to drying and freezing during winter months. This resulted in a reduction of the hydrilla infestation, but by no means gave complete control of this weed.

One of the goals of the Lake Murray Association is to maintain lake levels as near to full pool (360 msl) as possible. During the re-licensing process by SCE&G to operate Lake Murray, there was a lake level guide curve that was adopted where the lake level would operate at 358 ft. msl from March first until September first. Lake levels would not be drawn below 354 ft. msl during the fall and winter months. Lake Murray Association supported the adoption of the guide curve for managing lake levels.

During the discussions for re-licensing, there was a lake management consultant, Mr Jim Ruane for SCE&G who advised that the lake be drawn down periodically to scour sediment build up at inflow entry points. He advised that this would improve water quality.

The Lake Murray Association is very concerned with high water quality in the lake. We regularly take water samples which SCE&G analyzes for total phosphorous and fecal coliform. Generally, we have found that our samples show that water quality in Lake Murray is very good and meets acceptable fresh water standards for these two contaminants.

A search of the internet for a review of the "benefits of lake draw-downs" found one of the most frequently listed benefits was aquatic weed control. Draw-downs also allow home owners an opportunity to repair docks, clear trash from the shore line and make other permitted improvements. Lake Murray Association is anxious to monitor the impacts of the draw-down to the lake. We will continue to collect water samples to evaluate the effects on water quality. We plan to measure and photograph the build up of silt and sediment at inflow points when the lake is drawn down to 350 msl. We will return to the same locations just before the lake begins to be refilled to measure the level of scouring that has taken place during the draw-down period.

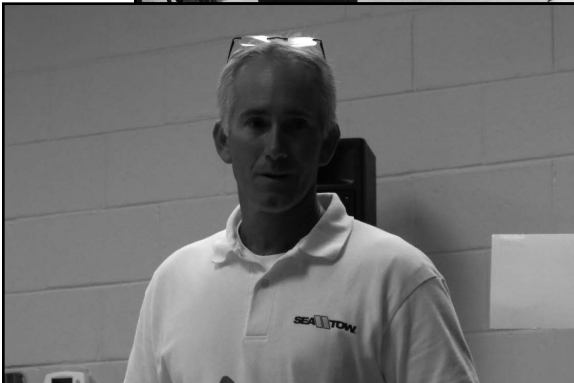
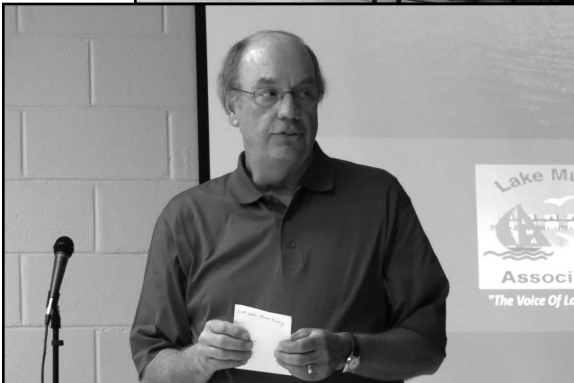
# Newberry County Meeting October 15, 2013

It was a full house at the Lake Murray Association Newberry County public meeting held on Tuesday, October 15, 2013, at the Macedonia Lutheran Church. Adding to the meeting's safety messages, a helicopter from Lexington County Sheriff's Department and boats from Lexington and Richland marine patrol units were on display in the parking lots.

LMA President Andy Hyman welcomed everyone and Pastor Randall Derrick of Macedonia Lutheran Church offered a prayer. Hyman introduced Senator Ronnie Cromer, SC State Senator 18th District, who represents 65% of the lakeshore residents. Cromer spoke about the Inter-Basin Transfer Act of 2011, which relates to the transfer of river basin waters from one place to another, and provides public input. He also briefed the crowd on a \$1.5 million grant shared by DHEC and DNR for an assessment of South Carolina's waters, rivers, lakes and aquifers.

1st Sgt. Dudley Britt, SCDNR, offered a colorful and informative presentation about law enforcement in Region 3 which covers 12 counties, including Lakes Murray and Marion, in over 7700 square miles. There are 45 full time officers in Region 3, with two officers on military deployment. In Lexington County this year there are five DNR officers covering 699 square miles, which works out to be about 140 miles per officer. Britt stated there are 26,641 registered boats and 2,757 personal watercraft in Lexington County, about 14% of all registered vessels in South Carolina. Two of the 14 recreational boating fatalities in 2012 occurred in Lexington and Saluda Counties.

Britt described the DNR aids to navigation program which is maintained statewide by a two person team that are responsible for all South Carolina waterways. Nearly half of all the buoys maintained by DNR are located on Lake Murray. Buoys that are damaged or off-station should be reported to (843) 953-9378.

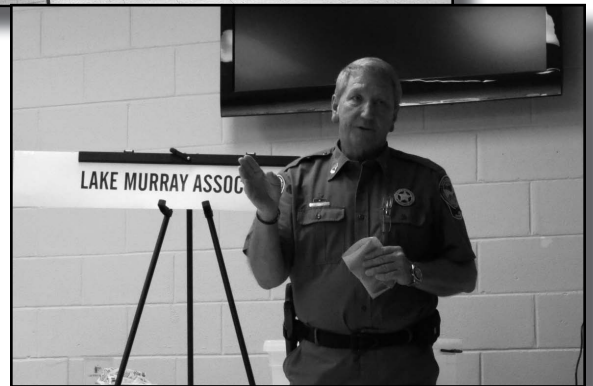
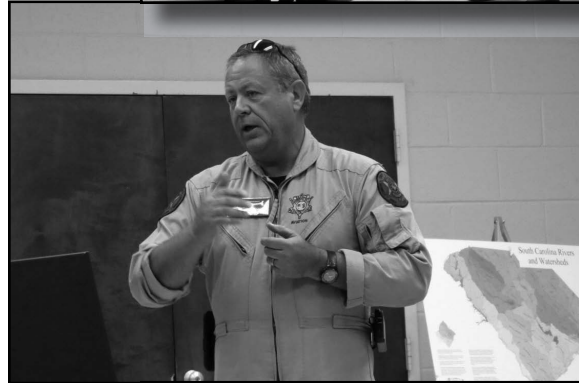


Lt. Mark McColman, Richland County Sheriff's Department (RCSD), Lt. Garry Rozier, Lexington County Sheriff's Department (LCSD), Deputy Ron Abrams, Newberry County Sheriff's Office (NCSO) and 1st Sgt. Britt, DNR, explained local law enforcement programs and activities specific to Lake Murray. Updated communication systems and equipment needs were discussed. The officers related the importance of the Lake Murray Safety Consortium that brings DNR and County Sheriff's Department marine patrol officers, U.S. Coast Guard Auxiliary, Lake Murray Power Squadron, LMA, SCE&G, and other agencies to combine forces for lake safety.

McColman applauded LMA's dock sign program that facilitates police and fire response from the waterside to the correct location. It also helps boaters find their way at night or in limited visibility. When marine patrol officers get calls from boaters who don't know where they are on the lake, and it's dark, they can quickly locate the boaters if a dock sign is posted.

SCE&G Vice President for Fossil and Hydro, Jim Landreth, informed the membership about the current state of the lake licensing process, unchanged as the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) assesses a potential risk to Atlantic short-nosed sturgeon. Landreth noted that the \$13 million application is pending with no firm date set for finalization.

Also of extreme interest to lake residents and users was the announcement that SCE&G would gradually drop the lake level to MSL 350 in early November for water quality improvements. As Landreth described it, shoreline environments accumulate silt and run-off from rains and flooding upriver. Lowering the lake level allows a natural occurrence for rain to "flush" and "scour" the shallow coves. This action benefits water quality and can greatly enhance shoreline fish habitat. Without the draw down, after a period of years the shoreline would be like a "desert floor" as described by DNR's Britt, and nothing would grow. SCE&G will begin raising the lake levels as rain permits, which is entirely unpredictable, but may be possible in January. This is the first drawn down since 2006, but the new license will require a drawn down every three years. Landreth says, "Our objective is to benefit the long term water quality of Lake Murray."



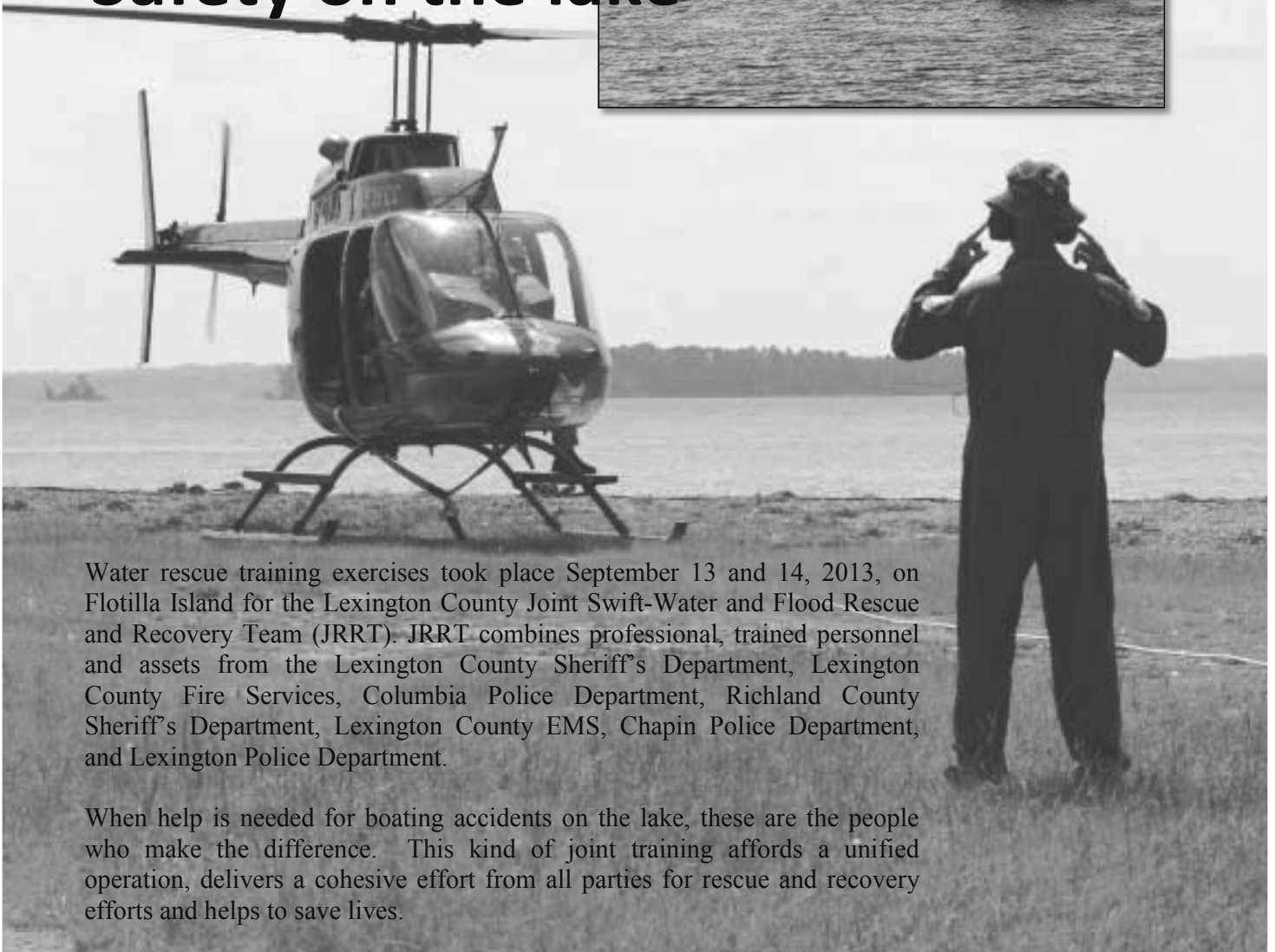

## Safety on the lake



Water rescue training exercises took place September 13 and 14, 2013, on Flotilla Island for the Lexington County Joint Swift-Water and Flood Rescue and Recovery Team (JRRT). JRRT combines professional, trained personnel and assets from the Lexington County Sheriff's Department, Lexington County Fire Services, Columbia Police Department, Richland County Sheriff's Department, Lexington County EMS, Chapin Police Department, and Lexington Police Department.

When help is needed for boating accidents on the lake, these are the people who make the difference. This kind of joint training affords a unified operation, delivers a cohesive effort from all parties for rescue and recovery efforts and helps to save lives.

# WATER SAMPLING RESULTS FOR OCTOBER 2013

Water samples were collected October 15 at two coves at two separate locations in Lake Murray. The results are shown below and indicate that levels of fecal coliform and total phosphorus were well below fresh water standards at all sampled sites. These are very good and desired results. No rainfall had occurred during the 5 days prior to sampling. At cove A, there is a history of heavy inflow of muddy water during significant rainfall. Phosphorus measurements are usually higher when samples are taken shortly after heavy rainfall, regardless of location where samples are taken. Fecal coliform levels were well below standards, though levels in cove B were slightly elevated (31.8) from the other three coves sampled.

## **AVOID DUMPING LEAVES INTO THE LAKE**

With the fall season of the year, there is an abundance of leaves to be disposed of. Home owners should take all precautions possible to prevent leaves from being blown or dumped into the lake. As leaves and other organic material decompose in lakes, they add phosphorus which lowers water quality. A high phosphorus level is one of the primary contributors to the development of algal blooms in lakes.

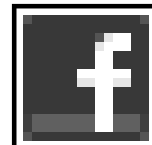
